Background:

County Art Collection

Continuing with the County's mandate established in 1982 to secure art for the County, the Museum was pleased to select for 2023. This new piece will be displayed in the Office of the CAO.

Taylor Lasher, Saugeen Shores, Southampton, Ontario, A Path Best Followed

Taylor Lasher is an emerging young artist living and creating in an Ontario beach town called Southampton. She has always had the desire to create even from a young age and has continued to pursue her passion to create.

Taylor is a cancer survivor and open-heart warrior. These experiences have heavily shaped not only who she is as a person but the art she creates. In 2015, Taylor battled a rare form of bone cancer and ultimately underwent major surgery to remove her entire right scapula as well as the surrounding muscle. This surgery changed her life in many ways as she had to learn to do things differently, including how she paints. Four years later she also underwent open-heart surgery. Today, Taylor is currently living cancer free and managing her health each day.

Through Taylor's artwork, she hopes to invoke feelings of resiliency that can be found both in human nature and in the world around us. She connects deeply with the strength, power and peace that can be found in the mighty waves of Lake Huron or the way a flower continues to bloom after each season.



Education Programming & Outreach

KidZone Summer Camp

The first month of KidZone Summer Camp was a success with all four weeks in July completely sold out, totaling 72 campers. Led by two summer students, a Senior Leader and a Junior Leader, the participants enjoyed a variety of activities, including exploring the Museum exhibits, playing games outside, trips to the Jubilee Park splash pad, as well as attending the Wildlife presentations and working on crafts. The camp continues in August.

In-Museum Education Programs

The Museum delivered 10 educational programs in July, hosting 233 campers and students from visiting summer camps. Popular programs included the Teens Creative Minds Escape Room Challenge, The Grand Tour, and LEGO™ Design Challenges. The students were able to explore local Indigenous history and culture, use their critical thinking skills while learning about young Canadian inventors, and investigate the Science/Technology/Engineering/Art/Math (STEAM) based design process.

Outreach Programming

On July 14, the Education & Outreach Coordinator delivered an in-person senior outreach program called "Remembering Our Own." We travelled to the Wiarton Day Away Centre at Gateway Haven and led a hands-on discussion of First World War artifacts for 30 residents.

Marketing

July has been busy with several outreach initiatives designed to create awareness about the Museum and its summer programs. Marketing Outreach summer student Meghan organized and attended several events for the Museum throughout the month, including:

There has been a lot of interest about the Museum's ongoing summer events from both tourists visiting the area and locals during these outreach events, and attendance numbers suggest summer outreach is having an impact on Museum awareness. Attendance at local events continues to grow Post-COVID and the Museum's capacity to attend events is greatly increased and supported by having a marketing summer student this year. In August outreach work will extend to the Peninsula with attendance at events.



Marine Heritage Festival, July 21 & 22

The Museum once again partnered with the Marine Heritage Festival (MHF) to co-host the opening night kick-off party on July 21, and participated on Saturday, July 22 with a cardboard boat in the boat races and with a booth in Pioneer Park. More than 450 people attended the Friday night kick off party.



Programming

Wonderful Wildlife: July 5, July 12, July 26

The July Wonderful Wildlife program has been a success with all the shows sold out. The program aimed to educate and entertain visitors about various wildlife species, showcasing handle-friendly reptiles and Ontario wildlife. On July 5th, the program began with "Sciensational Snakes", a new animal presenter. Every attendee had the chance to interact with the reptiles up close, including handling a snake.





The following week, on July 12th, the program continued by welcoming back "Speaking of Wildlife" which showcased Ontario wildlife, and on July 26 "Zoo-to-you" returned with a wide array of reptiles and some zoo animals too.

Cultural Demonstrations: July 5, July 12, July 19, July 26

Throughout the month of July, the Museum had the privilege of hosting a diverse range of local Indigenous and Metis presenters and educators, each offering unique insights into their culture and heritage. On July 5th and July 26th, the Historic Saugeen Metis delighted visitors with the traditional textile demonstrations, providing a glimpse into the rich history and customs of the Metis people.

On July 12, the Museum welcomed Indigenous author, Dorothy Ladd who read from her book Memengwaa, The Monarch Butterfly. Her presence and storytelling skills engaged the audience, leaving them inspired by her literary contributions and her perspective on Indigenous culture and storytelling.

On July 19th, Indigenous knowledge keeper Natalka Pucan graced the event with her wisdom and traditional teachings. Her profound knowledge of Indigenous traditions, customs, and spirituality provided a unique opportunity for attendees to connect with authentic Indigenous wisdom.

Throughout July the Museum hosted a series of engaging activities including daily public tours at 11:00 am and 2:00 pm. Led primarily by the Programming summer student the guided tours took participants on a journey through both levels of exhibits, offering visitors an enhanced understanding of Bruce County's heritage and its significance.

In the outdoor exhibits, the summer student offered daily interpretation at the Mackenzie Log Cabin in the Museum's backyard. As visitors stepped back in time, they were greeted by a costumed interpreter who brought to life the daily activities and challenges of early settlers.
