


Introduction and Purpose


Why An Engagement Circle?

- Goals 1.4, 2.4 and 4.2, as well as the overall Saugeen Anishnaabek Reconciliation Pathway and Action Plan commit to establishing an advisory group to ensure that Saugeen Anishnaabek voices and knowledge are including decision making about Bruce County programming. Specifically:
 - Consult with Chippewas of Nawash Unceded First Nation, Saugeen First Nation, and Saugeen Ojibway Nation on major Bruce County-led projects, initiatives, or decisions with potential to impact Indigenous rights, titles, and interests.
 - Establish an advisory committee with Chippewas of Nawash Unceded First Nation,
 Saugeen First Nation, and Saugeen Ojibway Nation and County Council representation to
 activate work on creating a Downie Wenjack Legacy Space that will help build a safe and
 welcoming place for conversations about Indigenous history and reconciliation in Bruce
 County.
 - Establish advisory groups that are inclusive of Saugeen Anishnaabek to support Bruce County departments on program and service planning, design, delivery, review, monitoring, and evaluation
